  Community can mean:
  - people living in the same area.
  - people who have similar interests or life experiences but might not live in the same area.
- 3. Have good health and wellbeing

When talking about health, we usually mean physical health. And when we talk about wellbeing, we are normally talking about how a person feels emotionally. So, The National Lottery will look at how your project might help young people both physically and mentally.
