1. BACKGROUND

1.2. This agreement lays down the arrangements for the delivery of the programme in partnership between the Education Authority and the awarded partner (either as a single organisation or partnership of organisations)

2. PARTNERSHIP AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

2.1. The aim of this partnership is to deliver in partnership and collaboration in the designated area on the actions noted within the Regional Youth Development Plan and Regional Action plan through joint Statutory and Voluntary delivery to meet in summary the following objectives:

- 1) To design the youth voice model of delivery for the Regional Youth Voice project
- 2) To recruit and maintain a regional youth voice structure(s) of children and young people for the period of the funding
- 3) To design a youth programme that effectively supports the participant build their capacity to exercise their voice to influence decision making
- 4) Through the project provide advice to inform decision making in youth services and education
- 5) To develop, implement and evaluate partnership delivery

3. TARGET DELIVERY REQUIREMENTS

3.1. The partnership targeted delivery relates to any children and young people who live in Northern Ireland

4. PARTNERSHIP ACTIVITIES

4.1. Joint Local Statutory and Voluntary Responsibilities

In partnership the statutory and voluntary service provider will;

- 1) To co-develop and co-author and annual action plan to support the needs of children and young people and the objectives of the partnership
- 2) To recruit the agreed target number of participants across statutory and voluntary youth settings to participate on the programme

- 3) To coordinate the programme delivery with participants, which is provided consistently and on a weekly basis (blended approach of online and face to face) with a residential per quarter (face to face).
- 4) To build the capacity of participants to advocate on behalf of other children and young people to inform the decision making of the youth service
- 5) Through the Regional Youth Voice Project members, engage children and young people more widely across Northern Ireland to seek their views
- 6) To deliver the 'Small Grants Programme' as outlined in priorities for youth
- 7) Facilitate consultation with children and young people on a regional a basis at the request of the Education Authority on matters related to Youth Service and Education
- 8) Work together to support, or seek external support, to meet the objectives the partnership
- 9) Jointly report on the benefits of the partnership delivery under the agreed reporting arrangements
- 10) Be subject to external project evaluation and monitoring carried out by the Partnership, Practice and Workforce Development Partnership and its Advisory Board.

4.2. Education Authority Service Responsibilities

The Education Authority will;

- 1) Identify a lead statutory Senior Youth Worker I for co-delivery of the programme.
- 2) Ensure that in the event of staff absence owing to change management or medical leave that cover is provided by the organisation to ensure continued delivery of the programme.
- 3) Comply with Education Authority procurement processes, including budget monitoring and reporting
- 4) Will lead on the engagement and support of statutory participants to meet the objectives of the partnership
- 5) Subject to approval and availability of budget, the Education Authority will provide directly or through the partnership the budget resourcing for the agreed and approved delivery plan.

4.3. Lead Voluntary Partner Responsibilities

The Voluntary Partner Organisation will;

- 1) Appoint/Identify a lead voluntary staff member for co-delivery of the programme at Senior Youth Worker I Grade
- 2) Ensure that in the event of staff absence owing to change management or medical leave that cover is provided by the organisation to ensure continued delivery of the programme.
- 3) Will lead on the engagement and support of voluntary participants to meet the objectives of the partnership

- 4) Comply with the terms and conditions laid out in the letter of offer for grant aid assistance including financial reporting requirements.

5. MONITORING AND REPORTING

- 5.1. Voluntary funded partner(s) will be subject to the Education Authority's moderation and monitoring arrangements for grant aid assistance.
- 5.2. Both the statutory and voluntary partner will jointly report on the benefit framework agreed as part of the project, and/or identified in line with the strategy and subsequent action plans developed.

6. DATA SHARING

- 6.1. Although the implementation of the project is public, information exchanged in the context of implementation between the Education Authority and voluntary partners will remain confidential.
- 6.2. Except for beneficiary information, no information collected by the Education Authority will be "Subject Data". Beneficiary information will be collected in line with the Education Authority's duty to discharge its public task, and any data held will be in accordance with the Education Authority's privacy statement available [here](#).
- 6.3. Each partner will ensure it complies with the requirements of all legislation in force relating to the use of personal data and General Data Protection Regulation. (GDPR)
- 6.4. Partners will notify the Education Authority of any security threats, risks, incidents, data breaches and data protection impact assessments relating to implementing of this project and its beneficiaries.

7. SAFEGUARDING AND CHILD PROTECTION

- 7.1. It is everyone's duty to safeguard our children and young people and with respect to safeguarding and child protection, DUAL REPORTING in line with each organisations process will be in place for the programme, for all beneficiaries regardless of if engaged by the Education Authority or the Voluntary Partner worker, or both.
- 7.2. Safeguarding and child protection processes must be compliant with the Department of Education Circulars ([2012/19](#), [2013/01](#)) and current guidance contained with Annex E guidance for youth settings (and any subsequent update) of the Department of Education's [Safeguarding and Child Protection in Schools](#).

8. PROCUREMENT AND BUDGET ASSOCIATED WITH THE PARTNERSHIP

- 8.1. Voluntary Partner will be provided up front an allocation for Salaries and Management fee which can be used as outlined in the letter of offer.
- 8.2. Approval of any agreed budget to support delivery will rest with the Education Authority, including the option to directly provide additional funds to the voluntary partner provided the funding is used within the restricted nature of partnership activities.

- 8.3. Procurement of programme materials, activities, residentials, programme costs, transport and travel will be centrally procured through the Education Authority's procurement process and provided to directly to support the programme of work, which has been approved by the Education Authority.

9. PUBLICITY, COMMUNICATION, SOCIAL MEDIA AND BRANDING

- 9.1. All partners will ensure promotion of the partnership both towards potential organisations, beneficiaries and towards the public.
- 9.2. Each partner will comply with all publicity, communication and branding obligations for the Education Authority and the Partner Organisation, including any branding guidelines developed for and because of the partnership.
- 9.3. Each partner will ensure they have the necessary permissions in place for the sharing of participant images and the relevant channels they are shared through.
- 9.4. Each partner will ensure that any communication is transparent, unbiased, professional and above reproach, to reduce risk of reputational damage to each Voluntary Partner organisation and the Education Authority.

10. GOVERNANCE OF THE PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT

- 10.1. The delivery of this partnership will be overseen by a sectoral advisory sub-group who will provide advice, support, guidance, direction and scrutiny of delivery to the partnership (EA Statutory and Voluntary Partner)
- 10.2. Decisions related to funding and budget to support delivery of the partnership will rest with the Education Authority

11. WITHDRAWAL FROM THE PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT

- 11.1. A partner will be entitled to withdraw from the programme provided that one month's notice has been given to the Education Authority and provided that the Education Authority approves and consents to such withdrawal.
- 11.2. In the event that the Voluntary Partner withdraws from the programme, and in the interests of supporting the sector, the Education Authority will continue the delivery offering and reserves the right to identify a new partner.
- 11.3. If a partner wishes to withdraw, they will be obliged to return all funds that correspond to incurred costs that have not yet been delivered against this agreement.

12. FINANCIAL CONTRIBUTIONS

- 12.1. Each partner is responsible for guaranteeing a sound financial management of its budget in line with approved funding allocation with regarding eligible expenditure and procurement.

13. DISCLAIMER

- 13.1. It should be noted that by signing this document or by participating in this partnership agreement, the partners are not committing to legally binding obligations. It is intended that the partners remain

independent of each other and that their collaboration and use of the term 'partner' does not constitute the creation of a legal entity, nor authorise the entry into a commitment for or on behalf of each other.
